#### IV. Review of WVMCCD Foundation Board Minutes: July 29, 2024

• Jackie Costanzo made a motion to approve the minutes of the July 29, 2024 Foundation Board meeting. Bill McFarland seconded the motion. **Motion passed with unanimous decision.**

- o Frank Jewett made a motion to approve the unaudited financials from July September 2024 as presented. Mike Foulkes seconded the motion. **Motion passed with unanimous decision.**

  - Treasurer Bill McFarland presented the quarterly investment report from Q3 (July September 2024).

  - Katie Rohrer presented the report findings of the WVM Foundation board review. See attached report for details.

#### IX. Reports

- **1.** The Office of Advancement report was provided as a written report before the meeting. See attached report for details.
- 2. District: Chancellor Brad Davis
  - Brad Davis expressed his gratitude towards the team for their hard work and dedication. Brad

then announced the signing of the bill AB 3158 by the governor, which grants free tuition and fees to residents in their service area at West Valley-Mission Community College District. He also mentioned a partnership with external agencies to provide free food to students with free tuition. Furthermore, Brad announced a partnership with Sutter Health to build a hospital at the Mercado, adjacent to Mission College, which aligns with the college's future plans. He acknowledged the team's role in these successes and expressed optimism for the district's future evolution.

- 3. West Valley College: President Jennifer Taylor-Mendoza
  - Jennifer Taylor-Mendoza thanked the board for attending the West Valley College's 60th Anniversary Gala. She highlighted a 20% increase in enrollment for students aged 50 and above in the college's senior guided pathways programs. Next, Jennifer announced that West Valley College will support the Campbell Veterans Memorial Foundation during their annual gala event. She also shared that the college will host the Tour de Saratoga bike race on July 19, 2025. Jennifer mentioned that West Valley is in the process of getting approval for a bachelor's program in park management. She celebrated that two West Valley College students received a National Research Award Grant from the American Mathematical Association of Two-Year Colleges for their work on sustainability and will be honored at the 50th Annual Conference in Atlanta next month. Lastly, she stated that the E-Center will kick off Entrepreneurship Skills Week this week, featuring six events focused on networking, communication, and utilizing AI for business success.
- **4.** Mission College: President Seher Awan
  - Seher Awan highlighted that enrollment reached 103% of our target after the census, exceeding our goal by 3%. This marks a 7% increase compared to this time last year, despite an additional goal of 200 full-time students. The headcount is up by 8.2% from the previous year. Next, she announced that Mission College has launched a new Asian American, Native American, and Pacific Islander (APIDA) learning community focused on success, retention, and persistence for our students. Seher stated that Mission College's Strategic Education Master Plan was approved in June, allowing us to update our facilities master plan. She acknowledged the successful partnership between Elmwood Correctional Facility and Mission College. The Rising Scholars Program is dedicated to providing incarcerated and formerly incarcerated students in the South Bay/Bay Area with opportunities for continued higher education. Lastly, Seher mentioned that Mission College participated in the Silicon Valley Pride Parade and the Santa Clara Art and Wine Festival. The Fire Protection Technology program partnered with NorCal Women Fire Services to host the first "Alarm Girls" fire camp, which provided 80 high school female students with hands-on experiences about the fundamentals of basic firefighting over a two-day event. Seher also highlighted a staff visit to Ghana, Africa, for an immersive experience focused on the decolonization of higher education and creating enhanced support services for Black and African American students. Our team is currently developing a comprehensive 10-year plan to support learning strategies and goals for Black and African American student success on campus. Mission College hosted its annual 5K race fundraiser, which had the largest attendance in its history. Finally, Seher announced the grand opening of the Mission Market Food Pantry, aimed at providing food resources to students.



## **Scholarship Program Update Report**

## 2025 Scholarship Cycle Overview

The West Valley-Mission Foundation is pleased to provide an update on the 2025 scholarship cycle. Below is a summary of key milestones and activities completed, as well as the upcoming schedule for awarding scholarships at both West Valley College and Mission College.

## 1. Scholarship Award Payout Calculation

- The Advancement Office has completed the annual payout calculations, which determine the award amounts based on the residual interest generated from each endowment principal.
- We estimate awarding \$850,225 in scholarships from our endowment for the 2025 cycle.

## 2. Donor Outreach and Scholarship Renewals

- **Scholarship renewal requests** for expendable scholarships have been sent to donors. This outreach included:
  - Two renewal request mailings:
    - 1. First letter: August 2024
    - 2. Second letter: September 2024
  - o Follow-up communications: Phone calls and emails in August 2024.
  - o Pledge commitment deadline: October 31, 2024
  - o Scholarship payment deadline: December 31, 2024

#### 3. Scholarship Application Process and Timeline

- **Application Opens:** December 1, 2024 Students will apply through the AwardSpring platform.
- Promotion of Scholarships: Program Directors and Financial Aid Staff actively promote scholarship opportunities to key student audiences.
- Application Closes: February 1, 2025
- **Application Review:** Selection committees will review applications throughout February and March.
- **Award Notification:** Awardees will be notified, and recipients will formally accept their scholarships.
- Scholarship Celebrations: In-person events will take place in May 2025 (dates TBD).
- Scholarship Disbursement: Awards will be sent to recipients.

#### **Scholarship Renewal Performance**

- **15% Renewal Rate**: Achieved from the scholarship introduction letters and renewal forms sent to donors in June 2024. This reflects a **10% increase** from the 2023 renewal rate.
- 80% Renewal Rate: Achieved through targeted outreach to donors of expendable scholarships in August and September 2024.
- Expendable Scholarship Renewals: Out of 39 expendable scholarships, 37 successfully renewed for the 2025 scholarship cycle, while 2 did not renew.

## **New Scholarships**

Advancement has established three new scholarships for the 2025 scholarship cycle.

## **Scholarship Endowment Performance Reports**

In October 2024, we will distribute the Scholarship Endowment Performance Reports to all endowment donors. The report will highlight the performance of their endowments, including the assets, income, and expenses for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024.

Additionally, donors will be notified that the Board of Directors voted to increase the annual distribution percentage from scholarship endowments. Starting this year, the Foundation will distribute 5% of the endowment's three-year average market value annually. Any excess funds will be reinvested to further grow the size of the endowment.

## Conclusion

The 2025 scholarship cycle is progressing smoothly, with renewed engagement from our donors. We look forward to awarding over **\$850,225** in scholarships, helping our students achieve their academic goals and succeed in their educational journeys.

We are grateful for the ongoing support of our donors, board members, and staff, whose collective efforts make this program successful.

Thank you for your continued partnership in empowering our students and strengthening the mission of West Valley-Mission Community College District.
